In 2021, Peer Power conducted research exploring the different ways Youth Justice Services (YJS) throughout England and Wales design their services.

We learnt that many YJS misunderstood the difference between co-creation, coercion and everything in between.


Some thought they were co-designing when, in fact, they were coercing.

To start with, we created a "flat ladder' to demonstrate the continuum between coercion and co-production.



We identified how different YJS across England and Wales are approaching activities from different "rungs" on the ladder. Let's take participation sessions as an example:
